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



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Examination Performance at Atlantic Academy Portland: 23rd August 2019 - 2nd Best in the Trust

We are delighted to announce that year 11 students from Atlantic Academy have done themselves incredibly proud with their results. The students have been on a rapid journey of improvement to make the progress that reflects their ability and will place them well above the national average, amongst the highest performing schools in Dorset. Over 68% of students gained 5 or more GCSEs at the standard pass rate (Grades 9-4). This is a fantastic reflection of all their hard work and dedication.

The headline figure of English with Maths stands at 53% and will place Atlantic Academy Portland above the national average for progress, and one of the highest progress figures in Dorset . 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



AQA Combined Science (Trilogy)

- Students are awarded a 'combined grade', this is from a 17 point scale with the top 9-9, to the bottom 1-1, or a U. There can be one grade difference between the grades but no more than this, for example a student could receive a 9-8 or a 4-3.
- 6 x Science exams (2 x Chemistry, 2 x Physics, 2 x Biology) Each is 1 hr 15 min long. This is a total of 7 hr 30 min of science examinations. Each exam counts **equally** to the combined grade. Therefore **doing well in all exams is vital** to get the highest combined grade.
- There is no controlled assessment, the course is 100 % exam based. . but there are 21 required practicals that the students have to know and these will be assessed throughout their 6 written exams

BTEC Courses

- All BTEC courses are to be completed by the end of the February half term 2020.
- Coursework for each of these courses will need to be completed to the students minimum target grade.
- Students will also sit their exam during the January/ February 2020 window all students will be aiming for a Pass as a minimum grade in these exams. Holiday in time will result in a non complete of exam -effecting 40% of grade.
- There will be the opportunity to resit the exam in May 2020 (except for business who sat first exam in year 10)





Vocational Coursework

- All Students study 3 vocational subjects which started in Year 10.
- Coursework for these subjects can contribute up to a total of 60% of these courses.
- The aim is for all coursework is to be completed by February half term 2020



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Vocational Coursework

- Failure to complete this coursework before the end of February half term may result in students gaining incompletes and unable to gain the a status in the qualification in Summer 2020.
- After school sessions and special event saturdays sessions will start 29th September, to support the completion of this coursework and will continue for the rest of this term.



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Self Quizzing

Why:

- The exams you sit will be the <u>hardest exams since O</u> <u>levels finished in 1987</u>
- In some subjects getting a C Or 4/5 grade will be harder next year than it is right now.
- We need to help you retain a huge amount of knowledge over the next 9 months so that you are successful and can go on to do amazing things with your life.



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What is self quizzing?

- The self-quiz is designed to memorise fundamental information.
- You cover up one side of the Knowledge Organiser, look at the concept, write out the definition from memory then self-check and self-correct any spelling mistakes (in a purple pen).



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What is self quizzing?

- Test yourself until you have learned it by heart for a minimum of 30 minutes each evening, to prepare for a written quiz the next day.
- To further extend this, the knowledge will be linked to your DO NOWs and become part of the settle activity. It will be tested by 'closed book spot checks' and by whole class choral responses.



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Self quizzing is not hard to do.



Knowledge has to be built on knowledge, it has to have something to link to.

If it can't attach itself to something already known, it cannot be retained.



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But doing it right requires self discipline.

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Self-Discipline

- Very easy to copy straight from your Knowledge
 Organiser into your practice book don't do this!
- You will not learn the content or be able to recall it at a later date.
- It may take you longer at first, but once you develop your technique, you should make fewer mistakes and the knowledge will sink in to your long-term memory.



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Successful Self-Quizzing: 3 Easy Steps

- 1. Read and memorise the section. Read and re-read the section, say it out loud if necessary, until you are confident enough to use your practice book to write it down. For 30 minutes' minimum each day, actively memorise the knowledge until you are not getting it wrong.
- 2. Cover it up, and write it out. Close your knowledge organiser or cover up the section, and to try to recall the knowledge. Write out the section from memory.
- 3. Check it and correct any mistakes. Open your knowledge organiser and look at the answers tick the ones you got right and correct the ones you got wrong in a green pen. Do the ones you got wrong again, until you get them right.



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Self-Discipline

- Don't play music
- Keep the television off
- Put your mobile on silent and move it away from you: No texting, no calls, no Snapchat, no WhatsApp or Facebook notifications
- No games consoles etc.
- They will all be there when you have finished.



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Excellence Is A Habit

- 100% Everyday. No Shortcuts.
- Revision is an ongoing process that has already started – preparation for GCSEs.
- Dedicated practice and self-discipline.
- Shifting knowledge into long term memory, freeing up working memory.

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Rewards and Awards

Everyday Rewards:

Smiles, thumbs up, nods and approving phrases all contribute towards an ethos that encourages success. The conduct of staff has a profound effect on our students, so we display a genuine interest in the students, we welcome them and we greet them at the door.

The underlying principle at Atlantic is that we always reward academic achievement and behaviour that meets our expectations.

- Secondary subject area rewards Positive text messages, praise postcards, telephone calls, and verbal praise, Hero of the Week, Scientist of the Week.
- Golden Tickets Each lesson a student is awarded a Golden Ticket for their outstanding contribution to the lesson.
- **Ready for Learning Cards** Students carry these in their blazer pockets, and staff can sign them in order to award positive points for exemplary behaviour outside the classroom.
- Secondary points These are awarded on Progresso as positive points. Students have a weekly summary of these points and as they accumulate students are awarded certificates under the Bronze, Silver, Gold, Platinum and Diamond categories of the Atlantic Baccalaureate Award. Each week students who have gained 10 or more positive points are entered into a cash draw for secondary students.



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Rewards and Awards

Award Schemes

In addition to our daily rewards students have opportunities to gain credit for personal growth and positive behaviour through a number of award schemes.

The Atlantic Baccalaureate Award

Behaviour points are added on the Progresso system and those who attain the required net points totals are rewarded in Bronze, Silver, Gold, Platinum and Diamond categories. In addition to this, students who have gone a whole term with zero negative points will be awarded the Zero Hero Award.

The British Values Award

This award supports our students develop their characters, commitment and confidence. The award scheme requires that students have a good knowledge and understanding British Values, and collect evidence of themselves expressing these values.

• The Zero Hero Award

These much sought-after badges are awarded at the end of each Unit of Work. They are awarded to students with zero negative points.

Attendance Awards

All students with attendance of 97% or above at the end of each term receive a film afternoon. Students with 100% attendance also get sweets and popcorn. Each week every secondary student with 100% has their name put into a raffle and the winner receives a cash/voucher prize.

Academy Colours

Sports Colours are awarded for consistent membership of an Academy team, County team or higher, excellent team spirit and/or leadership of a team.

End of Year and Subject Awards

Awards for Endeavour and Achievement are made at the end of the year. These are made at the recommendation of staff, and awarded at the Celebration of Achievement Assemblies.

• The Principals' Award

At the end of each Unit, a nomination is given to the Pastoral Leads by tutors for one boy and one girl whom they believe deserve to win this prestigious award because of their continued hard work and effort in school.
