Dear Parents

I know I speak for all staff at Atlantic when I say that we have experienced a first term like never before in our profession! This term is always notoriously busy – it has been a chance for us to welcome our fantastic new Year 7s, understand what the 'new normal' way of working together safely feels like, see our curriculum plans come to life in the classroom and embrace the adventure of another great year ahead...all whilst we navigate COVID-19 concerns and measures.

We are pleased that even though students are not in specialist rooms, we are still able to offer them a broad and balanced curriculum during these times. All students are following their normal timetables. Our goals are still to deliver a rigorous, engaging curriculum, to improve outcomes for all our students and to provide opportunities for cultural enrichment. This means that over 14 subjects are still offered at Key Stage Three - in order to enable this, subjects such as Computer Science, Design technology and Food Technology are delivered on a rotation basis: in Years 7 & 8 this is delivered through the ATL curriculum and in Year 9 as a stand alone rotation. Our curriculum is clearly planned and sequenced to allow for an all-through provision. The subject overviews within key stages and across different year groups can be found here:

Year 7

Year 7 have made a really positive start to their secondary school career at Atlantic. Staff have been impressed with their attitude and desire to do well at school and I am encouraged by their transition from primary school, particularly in these unusual times. Thank you for supporting your child and the academy at the beginning of an exciting journey. Your support throughout the next five years will contribute immensely to your child's wellbeing and success at Atlantic Academy.

AAT - New region "The South West"

There has been a recent change in the organisation of the Aspirations Academies Trust in our region. When we became part of the Aspirations Trust there were three regions: South Central, West London and South Coast. With Budmouth and Bovington Primary joining the South Coast in 2019/20 and now the new Livingstone Academy (Bournemouth) having been confirmed as opening in September 2021, it was felt that the South Coast area has become too large and had more schools than the other regions. The decision was taken, therefore, to create a new region: 'South West'. As of next half term, Budmouth, Bovington and Atlantic make up this new smaller region and we hope that we will be joined by some other schools in the future. David Herbert has been asked to take up the temporary position of Regional CEO South West, alongside his role as Principal at Budmouth. This will also begin after October half term.

Parent Governor

The deadline has now passed for applications from our parents to become the Parent Governor who will represent the primary and secondary phase on the South West Regional Board. I am please to confirm that our Parent Governor position for Primary is Mr Grundonner (Atlantic parent) and for Secondary - Mr Browne (Budmouth parent).

Exams will begin on **7 June and end on 2 July** for almost all GCSEs. Results day will now be held on **27th August** for GCSE students.

Over the next six weeks, the Government will try to identify any risks to exams at a national, local and individual student level and will consider measures needed to address any potential disruption. More details will be published later in the Autumn, to ensure students have confidence that they will be fairly treated in terms of assessment in 2021.

However, although the government announced that schools will get 3 more weeks to prepare Year 11 for examinations, that time can be lost quickly when bubbles have to isolate. This means that we need you to explain to your children that socialising outside of their school bubble increases the risk of a whole year group being sent home. Students need to avoid parties and other events that are above 6 in number and reduce their contact with pupils from other schools. The rule of 6 is the law and after the Prime Minister's statements last Monday, it is likely to be enforced more stringently.

Please can I ask you for your continued support in helping everyone stay as safe as possible? This will allow us to continue to remain open. Thank you for observing social distancing, for following the measures we have in place within school and for being extra careful during social times outside of school.







1. Aaron Griffiths - How sports are dealing with the pandemic (Sports)





Social and physical distancing measures introduced to stop the spread of the virus have had an enormous effect on people's ability to participate in sports and leisure activities. The Olympic and Paralympic games have been postponed until 2021 for the first time in modern history. In addition to this impact, there is a huge risk that smaller sports clubs and less mainstream sports will suffer from financial hardship and may be forced to close. If participation in sport across a nation decreases, it is most likely to affect the vulnerable members of our society the hardest.

International Governments are desperate to restart sporting activities due to the disruption it will have on the health, mental well-being and economy of their countries and populations. Sporting bodies are being urged to reassess their sporting models in order to adopt more compliant ways of participating; for example, FIFA have teamed up with the World Health Organisation to look at how stadiums can be adapted to safely allow spectators back into live events, as well as helping to communicate Covid guidelines to those communities who might not engage directly with Government advice.

2. Solomon Ashe - The effects of Covid and quarantine on the younger generation

We all know the pandemic is having a lot of effects on everybody socially, especially on the younger generation. Although it may seem to adults that we are addicted to our devices and being locked inside would be paradise for us, the younger generation rely heavily on social contact for growth... without it many young people are feeling lost and depressed. Many students just beginning their university and college studies are feeling isolated and neglected and are saying it is not worth the large amount of money to pay for university and college courses when all they receive is a video call every other day. However, our current situation can also be seen as a good time for the younger generation, as it means more attention is being given to the people who need it and there is a focus on what is needed in education and entertainment for the younger people right now. Young people are being given the opportunity to go to online safe spaces and forums to express their individuality and their concerns,

and this has been a step forward in provision for younger people. Overall, everyone in the younger generation is working hard to maintain some normality and have fun while staying safe and keeping those around them safe.





3. Skye Parrott- The economy and furloughing during the pandemic

The question has to be asked: 'Has the UK economy collapsed?'

Since the dramatic start of lockdown, the UK has experienced a shocking drop in GDP. Production, services and construction and almost everything associated with economic activity has been put on hold. By April 2020, the UK economic data indicated that over 15,000 businesses were affected catastrophically by the virus as customer demand fell significantly, leading to disruption in factories and supply chains. Between March 2020 and April 2020, GDP fell by 20.4%, which is approximately £30 billion.

However, not all businesses were affected negatively; people started shopping online which supported new online businesses to develop and thrive.

The industries that have suffered greatly because of the pandemic are:

- Sporting events
- Accommodation
- Restaurant and Bars
- Cultural activities and libraries
- Entertainment activities
- Transportation
- Education

By the end July restrictions were lifted with some conditions, for example 2m distance and sanitise in every shop. The government desperately needed to raise the GDP in order for Britain's economy to be saved. For example, they allowed people to go to bars/restaurants as the public would get £10 per head. The big question now is, 'How will the second wave affect the UK economy?'.



4. Hallie Bird - Environment issues during the pandemic -

The environment has been positively affected in many ways over the past year by the Coronavirus pandemic, primarily because less toxic gases have been released into the atmosphere. This has happened because many different modes of transport have not been in use; for example, there have not been so many plane flights emitting carbon dioxide or car trips to work emitting carbon carbon monoxide and nitrogen oxides. This has, overall, resulted in cleaner air. Cleaner air can also be a result of the factories being closed for months and less greenhouse gases having been released into the atmosphere. Something else that has improved over this past year is the amount of plastic going into landfill as lots of businesses have been manufacturing less, with the result that there's a lot less packaging being created.
