What Are SATs?

SATs are special tests that I will take at the end of Year 6.

They help show what I have learned in school, like reading, writing, maths, and grammar.

When Will I Take the SATs?

The SATs usually happen in May.

What Will the Tests Be Like?

There are different parts to the SATs:

One for Reading

One for Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar (SPaG)

Three for Maths (including Arithmetic and Reasoning)

Where Will I Take the Tests?

I will take the SATs in a calm place, like my classroom or another quiet room in school.

My teacher or a trusted adult will be there to help make sure everything goes smoothly.

How Can I Get Ready?

I can get ready by:

Listening in lessons

Asking questions when I don't understand

Practising my skills in class and at home

Getting plenty of sleep

Eating a good breakfast each day

I don't need to be perfect. I just need to try my best.

What If I Feel Worried?

It's okay to feel a little nervous. Lots of children feel that way.

I can talk to my teacher, a parent, or someone I trust.

They will help me feel better and remind me how well I've done this year.

What Happens After the SATs?

Once the SATs are done, we can celebrate!

I will still learn new things in school, go on trips, and have fun with my friends.

My SATs do not decide everything about me - they are just one part of my learning journey.
